Identification & Treatment of Youth at Risk for Psychosis

Psychotic disorders such as schizophrenia are considered to be among the most debilitating and distressing mental health conditions. Despite impacting approximately 3% of the population, many clinicians lack the training and resources to recognize and best work with this vulnerable group of people, leaving many with psychosis isolated, stigmatized, and without help. Nonetheless, growing evidence suggests that, with tailored early intervention, many people with psychosis can recover from illness and lead a life of their choosing in the community. This seminar will familiarize you with psychosis, emphasizing the early phases of illness. It will then demonstrate strategies for reducing stigma, increasing empathy, and facilitating early identification. I will share screening tools and briefly touch on treatment strategies, as well as provide clinical resources for comprehensive specialty care.

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The Presenter

Dr. Jason Schiffman earned his Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology from the University of Southern California in 2003 and is currently a Professor and Director of Clinical Training at the University of California, Irvine, within the Department of Psychological Sciences. His research is dedicated to enhancing the identification and treatment of individuals at risk for psychosis, with a particular focus on refining diagnostic processes, exploring the efficacy of psychosocial interventions, reducing stigma, and addressing health inequities. Dr. Schiffman has published over 200 scientific articles and serves on the editorial boards of Psychiatric Services, Schizophrenia Bulletin, and Early Intervention in Psychiatry (the latter of which he is an associate editor). He has successfully secured over \$20 million in external funding, including four active grants from the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), one of which is focused on suicide prevention for individuals at clinical high risk (CHR) for psychosis. Dr. Schiffman has cofounded three university-community partnerships dedicated to supporting individuals at risk for psychosis, including a SAMHSA-funded CHRP clinic in Maryland and a CHRP program in Southern California. He is a nationally recognized consultant, providing guidance to numerous CHRP programs across the country, and is an active member of the Early Serious Mental Illness Treatment and Technical Assistance (ESMI TTA) team, where he contributes to national efforts to enhance early intervention services. Additionally, he is one of only a few certified trainers in the administration of the Structured Interview for Psychosis Risk Syndromes (SIPS). Dr. Schiffman is also leading the development of a new Ph.D. program in Clinical Psychology at UC Irvine, further advancing the field through education and training.
